



"Who Do You Say That I Am?" North Carolina Synod Assembly Worship Friday, June 2, 2023


NOTE ABOUT WORSHIP

Paraphrasing Jaroslav Pelikan, when asked why faith communities need a creed, he remarks, because praying "To whom it may concern" is too lonely - especially in difficult times. At the heart of Jesus' question to Peter, "Who do you say that I am?" Jesus invites Peter and the disciples into a deeper relationship with him. Even though Peter names Jesus "the Messiah, the Son of the Living God," he can only know what this means as he and the other disciples continue to follow Jesus.

Now, Jesus turns to us and asks, "Who do you say that I am?" This question is always much larger than we are, and, thankfully, we do not have to answer by ourselves. The gift of the Church is that the community who has come before us and the community who surrounds us answers this question with us. Through scripture, liturgy, sacraments, hymns and creed, our worship shapes our imagination as we faithfully respond to Jesus' question. The liturgy of our worship service this evening follows the seasons of the church year. Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter and Pentecost tell the story of Jesus' life and our life with Jesus.

Our prayer is that tonight's service deepens our relationship with Jesus and helps us as we respond together to Jesus' question, "Who do you say that I am?"

And they said, "Some say John the Baptist but others Elijah and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets." He said to them, "But who do you say that I am?" Simon Peter answered, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." And Jesus answered him, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven." Then he sternly ordered the disciples not to tell anyone that he was the Messiah.

From that time on, Jesus began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and undergo great suffering at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes and be killed and on the third day be raised. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him, saying, "God forbid it, Lord! This must never happen to you." But he turned and said to Peter, "Get behind me, Satan! You are a hindrance to me, for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."


Then Jesus told his disciples, "If any wish to come after me, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me.

Creed


